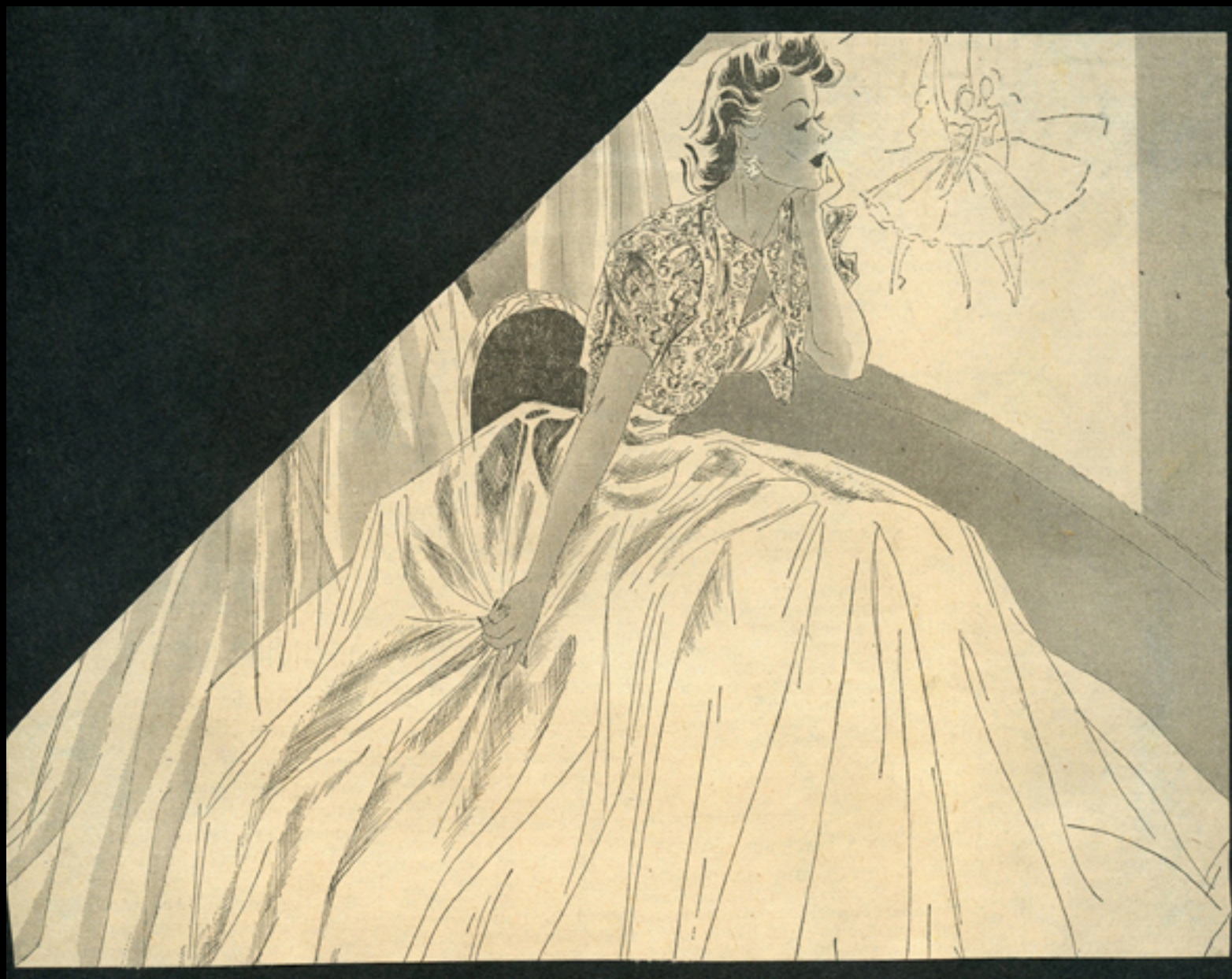

Death Takes Mother Of F. Snodgrass

Widow Of Former
County Sheriff June,
Dies In Hospital 1940

Mrs. Addie E. Snodgrass, beloved mother of Fred Snodgrass, former Oxnard mayor and prominent local electrical dealer, died in Santa Monica hospital late Monday after a brief illness, it was learned here today.

Mrs. Snodgrass, widow of A. J. Snodgrass, former county sheriff and prominent in the county's political life before the turn of the century, was well-known throughout Ventura county and her passing came as a shock to her many friends here.

Mrs. Snodgrass was born in California in 1856. She came to Ventura county as a child, and later became acquainted with the Snodgrass family, one of the earliest county pioneer families. She married Mr. Snodgrass who became county sheriff in 1882, serving in the capacity for eight years to 1890.

Mr. Snodgrass was prominent in county politics throughout his life, formerly being undersheriff under Sheriff Joseph Detroy, whom Mr. Snodgrass succeeded. William H. Riley succeeded Mr. Snodgrass as sheriff in 1890. Riley later became prison warden at Folsom.

LEFT HERE IN '94

Mrs. Snodgrass left Ventura county in 1894 to go to Los Angeles, where she and her sister, Mrs. Julia Gove, entered the hotel business. They operated the Hotel Lilly on Hill street opposite the park on Fifth and Sixth streets, Los Angeles, the location at that time considered "too far away from the business district." Later, they built and opened the Hotel Baltimore, which stood where the present Athletic Club building is located.

Mrs. Snodgrass was a member of the Eastern Star.

Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. tomorrow from Pierce Brothers mortuary, Los Angeles, with burial following at Rose-dale. Dr. Roberts, of the Adams Street Presbyterian Church will officiate.

Besides her son, Fred, of Oxnard, and her sister, Mrs. Gove, Mrs. Snodgrass is survived by a sister, Mrs. A. J. Salisbury of Los Angeles, and four brothers, all living: Charles McCoy of Brooklyn, and James, Floyd and Bert McCoy of Los Angeles.

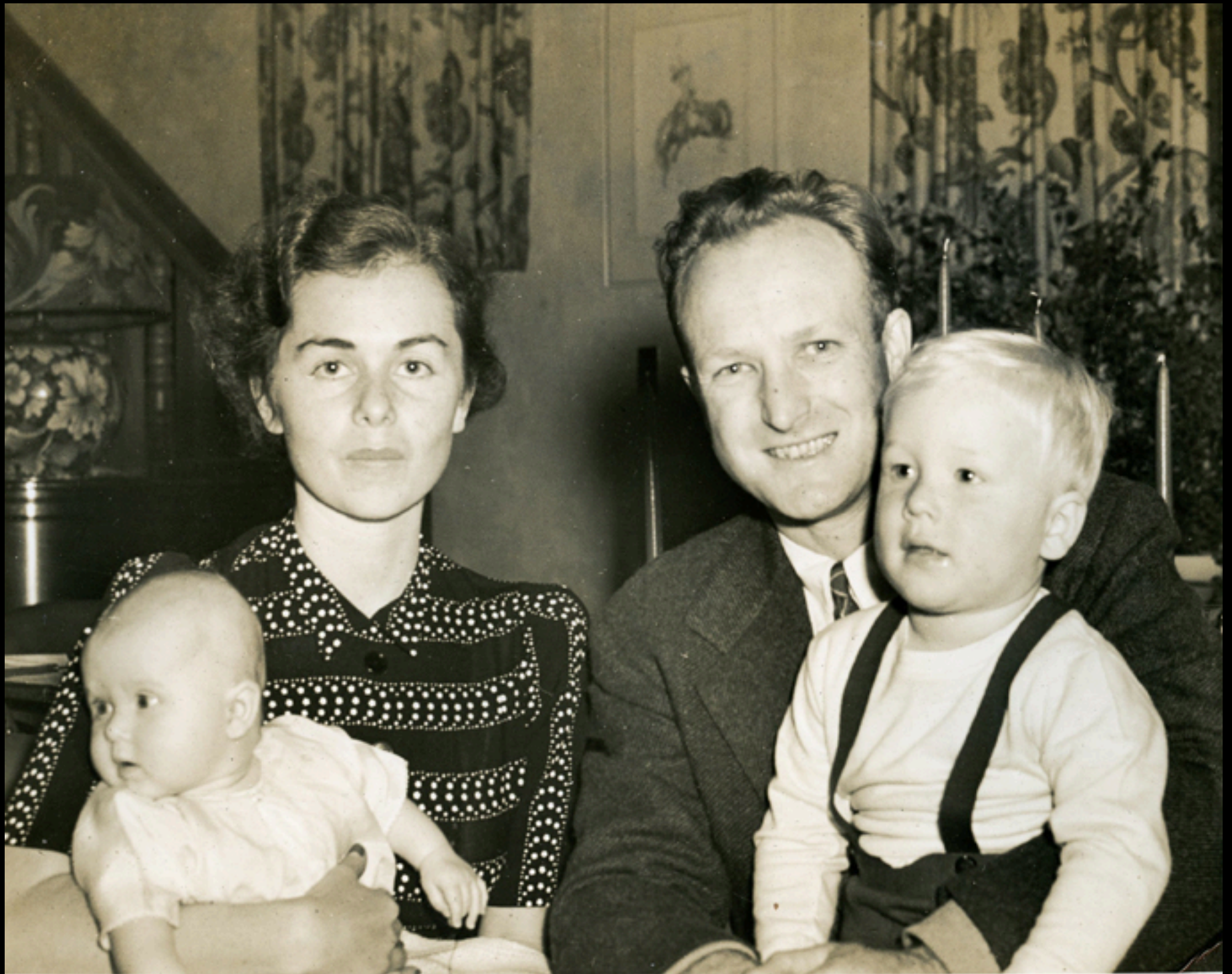

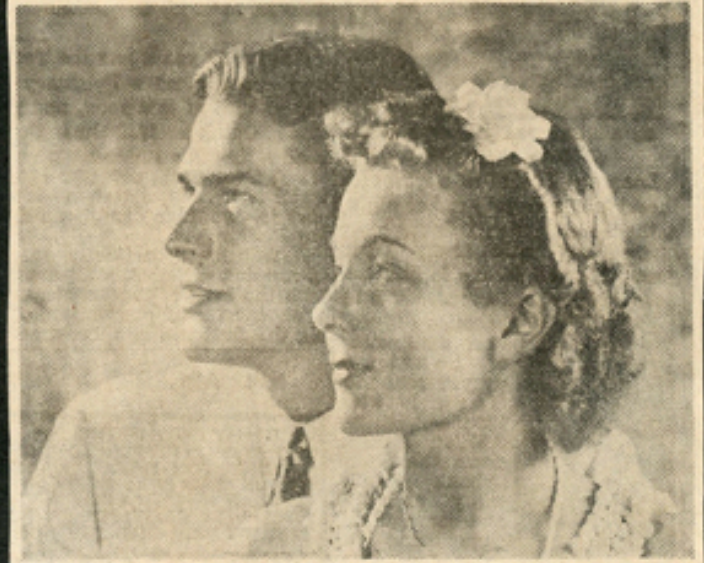

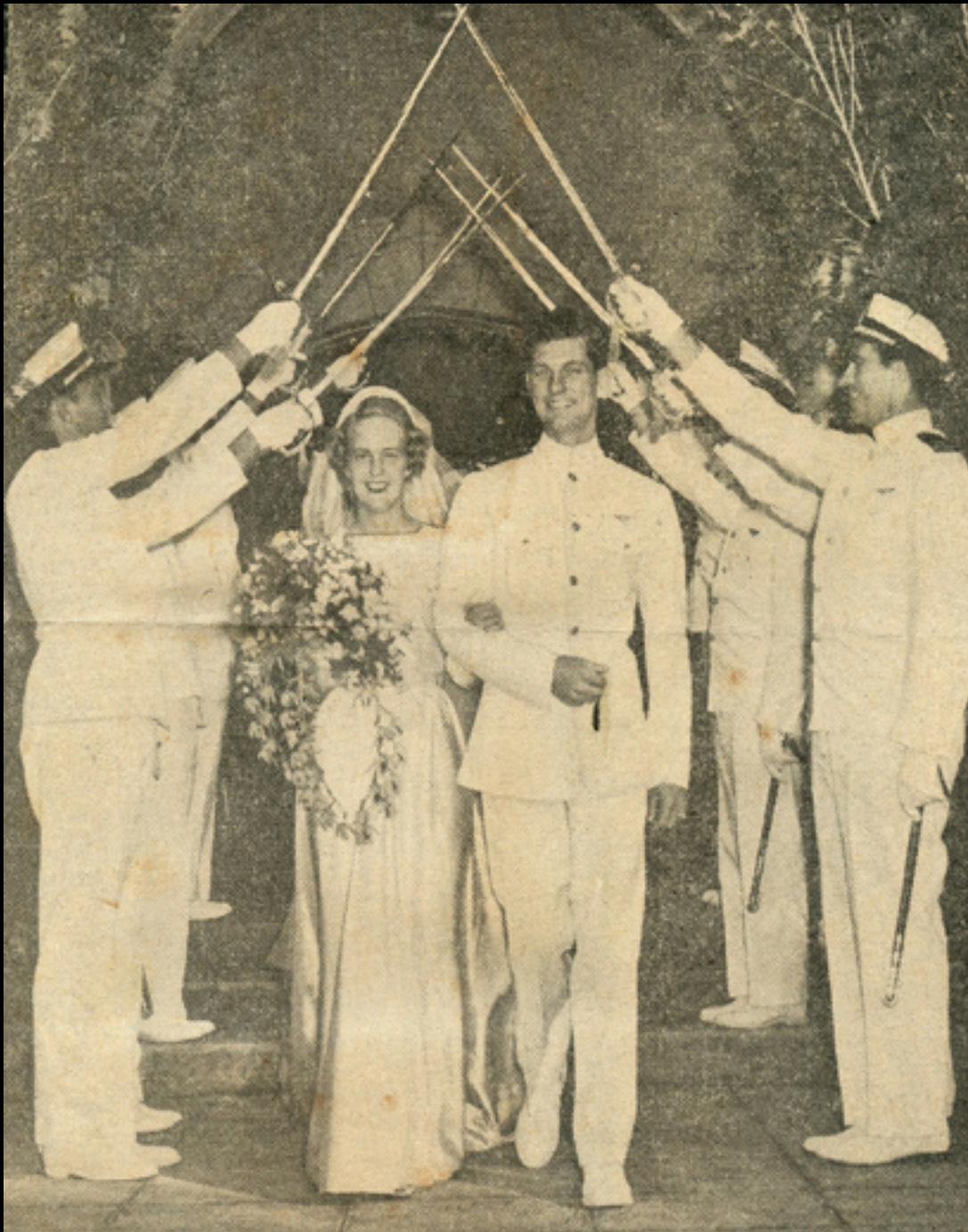

AT SEA
14 June 1941.

For the better instruction of and information to all landlubbers and pollywogs, the following is hereby published:-----

The ancient Romans had a god called Neptune. Poseidon, he was, to the Greeks. As Saturn's son, in Roman mythology, Jupiter and Pluto were his brothers. The sea was his domain. Ancient art shows him --sometimes with a trident in his right hand, a dolphin in his left and with one of his feet resting on part of a ship---sometimes in a chariot drawn by sea-horses, with a triton on each side.

Loyalty, allegiance, and service to Neptunis Rex, Great Lord of the Seas dates from the days of the earliest sailing men. Pagan mariners prayed to the god of the sea. They feared the storms he raised, and sought by sacrifice and offering to appease his wrath. For centuries the natural terrors of the ocean - strong gales and mountainous seas - were less appalling than the creatures of the seafarers' imaginations, the sirens, the monstrous sea-serpents, and all other minions of the deep. Even the Norsemen, ancient and hardy sailors though they were, paid homage to Neptune, setting aside a certain parallel of latitude, eventually extending south of the thirtieth parallel. So frightful were the figments of the minds of these superstitious sailors that civilization blundered across long eras of Dark Ages before there came hardy souls daring enough to venture into the wide expanses of the open oceans.

But ultimately, there came a Renaissance of education and sanity. The New World was discovered by Columbus whose sailors even in that late day were always on the brink of mutiny because of superstitious fears. Came the day when the sails of adventurers, The Drakes, Morgans and the mighty armadas of the old world dotted the northern seas.

Below the equatorial belt remained the waters of mystery where ships seldom ventured and where lack of acquaintance left the place a fearful source of the colorful superstitions and fear handed by tellers of seaman's tales.

Today, Neptune, divested of his genuine deity, has been left the watery Realm of southern climes. With the passing of fear for him, sailors retain the custom of offering sacrifice in a lighter and more playful vein. Steeped in tradition, the crossing of the Line has been made a boisterous ritual, elaborated upon and considerably standardized. No ship, however urgent its errand or how dignified its mission, is immune from a visit from Neptunis Rex and his Royal Court.

All hands will know when they approach the Line, for Davy Jones, the Secretary to His Royal Highness will appear out of the sea the night before. 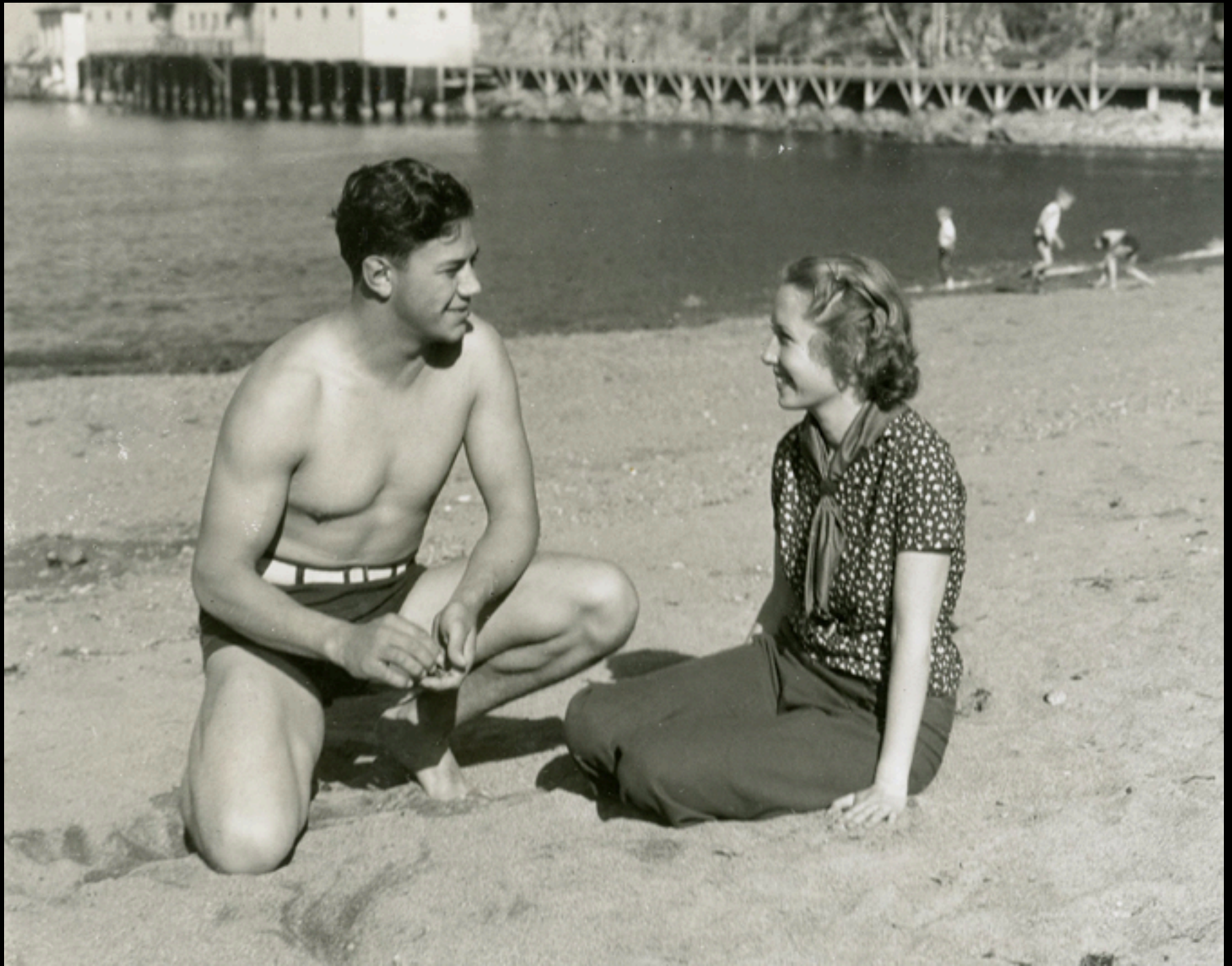
