




## Gay Affair Honors Miss Jean Snodgrass

#### Al Barnes Talks to Lefevers in Honolulu On Short-Wave Radio

When Albert D. Barnes, Ventura attorney, tuned in on his shortwave radio the other night he had no idea that he would soon be talking to Mr. and Mrs. Buzz Lefever in Honolulu.

Barnes tapped out a message on his shortwave key, picked up a station in Honolulu and opened a conversation with an amateur who said he was a member of the army air corps.

# Death lakes Mother Of

Widow Of Former Sume County Sheriff 1940 Dies In Hospital

Mrs. Addie E. Snodgrass, beloved mother of Fred Snodgrass, former Oxnard mayor and prominent local electrical dealer, died in Santa Monica hospital late Monday after a brief illness it was learned here today.

Mrs. Snodgrass, widow of A. J. Snodgrass, former county sheriff and prominent in the county's political life before the turn of the century, was well-known throughout Ventura county and her passing came as a shock to her many friends here.

Mrs. Snodgrass was born in California in 1856. She came to Ventura county as a child, and later became acquainted with the Snodgrass family, one of the earliest county pioneer families. She married Mr. Snodgrass who became county sheriff in 1882, serving in the capacity for eight years to 1890.

Mr. Snodgrass was prominent n county politics throughout his life, formerly being undersheriff under Sheriff Joseph Detroy. whom Mr. Snodgrass succeeded. William H. Riley succeeded Mr. Snodgrass as sheriff in 1890, Riley later became prison warden at Folsom.

#### LEFT HERE IN '94

Mrs. Snodgrass left Ventura county in 1894 to go to Los Angeles, where she and her sister, Mrs. Julia Gove, entered the hotel business. They operated the Hotel Lilly on Hill street opposite the park on Fifth and Sixth streets, Los Angeles, the location at that time considered too far away from the business district." Later, they built and opened the Hotel Baltimore, which stood where the present Athletic Club building is located. Mrs. Snodgrass was a member of the Eastern Star.

Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. tomorrow from Pierce Brothers mortuary, Los Angeles, with burial following at Rose dale, Dr. Roberts, of the Adams Street Presbyterian Church will officiate.

Besides her son, Fred, of Oxnard, and her sister, Mrs. Gove, Mrs. Snodgrass is survived by a sister, Mrs. A. J. Salisbury of Los Angeles, and four brothers. all living; Charles McCoy of Brooklyn, and James, Floyd and





#### GROSSING THE LINE-SIC TRANSIT GLORIA MUNDI

AT SEA 14 June 1941.

For the better instruction of and information to all landlub bers and pollywogs, the following is hereby published:----

The ancient Romans had a god called Neptune. Poseidon, he was, to the Greeks. As Saturn's son, in Roman mythology, Jupiter and Pluto were his brothers. The sea was his domain. Ancient art shows him --sometimes with a trident in his right hand, a dolphin in his left and with one of his feet resting on part of a ship---sometimes in a chariot drawn by sea-horses, with a triton on each side.

So frightful were the figments of the minds of these superstitious sailors that civilation blundered across long eras of Dark Ages before there came hardy souls daring enough to venture into the wide expanses of the open oceans.

But ultimately, there came a Renaissance of education and sanity.
The New World was discovered by Columbus whose sailors even in that
late day were always on the brink of mutiny because of superstitious
fears. Came the day when the sails of adventurers, The Drakes, Morgans
and the mighty armadas of the old world dotted the northern seas.


Below the equatorial belt remained the waters of mystery where ships seldom ventured and where lack of acquaintance left the place a fear-ful source of the colorful superstitions and fear handed by tellers of seaman's tales.

Today, Neptune, divested of his genuine deity, has been left the watery Realm of southern climes. With the passing of fear for him, sailors retain the custom of offering sacrifice in a lighter and more playful vein. Steeped in tradition, the crossing of the Line has been made a boisterous ritual, elaborated upon and considerably standardized. No ship, however urgant its errand or how dignified its mission, is immune from a visit from Neptunis Rex and his Royal Court.

All hands will know when they approach the Line, for Davy Jones, the Secretary to His Royal Highness will appear out of the sea the night before. If he is assured from the course of the ship and its speed that the Line will be crossed the following day, he presents the Captain with a Summons to appear before the Royal Court, bringing all landlubbers and polywogs for initiation into the Royal Order of the Deep. Rumors regarding vital military matters have been spreading through the Bay Area - in the barber shop and the industrial plant, the beauty shop and the longshore gang, the restaurant and the political office.

Whether these rumors are true or untrue is beside the point.

Either way, they are FODDER FOR THE ENEMY, as military information

to be used against us, or as fuel with which to undermine our morale.

In view of these circumstances, the Navy wishes to repeat the following warning:

You are violating the security of the United States and endangering the lives of your fellow-Americans if you fail to observe these precautions:

- 1. DON'T discuss movements or concentrations of our Navy or merchant ships.
- 2. DON'T discuss new military techniques or new weapons.
- 3. pon'T discuss defense plant production capacities.
- 4. DON'T discuss movements or concentrations of Naval personnel or Marines.
- 5. DON'T discuss Naval shore construction projects.
- DON'T discuss reports of damage to ships, Navy property, or Navy material until it has been OFFICIALLY announced by the Navy.
- 7. DON'T discuss casualties of the Mavy or Marine Corps unless OFFICIALLY announced by the Mavy or Marine Corps.

It is VITAL that you do not discuss these things with

THIS IS A MODERN WAR. The enemy will utilize every conceivable means to obtain information on these subjects.

His spies will be listening for the stray spoken word, watching avidly for the chance clue in the printed story, listening attentively for the radio announcer who will blunderingly reveal, in one innocent-sounding phrase, enough information to sink a troop packed transport or blast a shipyard.

THIS IS A TOTAL WAR, and every civilian is in it. It is the responsibility of every civilian to KEEP FROM THE ENEMY AND HIS AGENTS that information they will be constantly seeking.

THIS IS A HARSH WAR. There is an ESPIONAGE ACT which provides drastic wartime penalties for divulgence of information of these types to the enemy.

Before you speak, consider: Could the enemy translate this information into a torpedo attack on one of our ships, or a bomb attack on a defense plant? If he could, DON'T DIVULCE IT.






